Publish or perish: a walk through the publication process #2

Wednesday, May 22nd, 2019

In the second workshop of this block, the topic was review process, which is critical for a scientific paper to get published. Participants discussed the reviewing process from the perspectives of the editor, reviewer, and author, respectively. The reviewing criteria may vary with different kinds of journals. Some require the study to have **novelty and impact**, while others only require **scientific soundness**. We talked about the responsibilities of the **handling editor**. Participants were introduced to the guide for the handling editors of a journal. We also talked about the roles of the **reviewer**. Participants were introduced to tips of reviewing a paper professionally, and questions and criteria for reviewers from two journals. Being a reviewer can be recognized and have benefits in some ways, although it is a non-profit job in most cases. We talked about rules of writing responses to reviewers. Students shared their “horror” stories in dealing with editors and reviewers, and we also discussed the peer-review system in general. The “horror” stories revealed that problems can happen in the peer-review system, but it is well-recognized and there hasn’t been a matured alternative system so far. However, there is some endeavor in improving the system, “Peerage of Science” (<https://www.peerageofscience.org/>), where researchers can review the posted manuscripts freely and the authors can use these reviews in submitting to certain journals, thus facilitating the publishing process.

For all graduate students in the doctoral program, one thing is certain: you must publish at least one paper in an international scientific journal. It can be challenging to navigate the world of publishing, so this block of workshops is aimed at helping you familiarize with the process and provide useful tips of the trade to bring you confidence - if not immediate success - in your efforts.

The next workshop in the series (Wednesday, May 29th) will focus on writing the **cover letter**. We will have an overview of the function of cover letter and how to write a good cover letter. Students will work in groups to practice choosing the right journal and developing proper strategies to write a cover letter based on the abstracts that will be distributed to them. Different strategies will be used depending on whether the study is written for more



general groups of readers or specialists in a certain field, whether the study focuses on methodology or empirical research, and whether it is a fundamental or applied study.
